The Surprise Valley joint Unified School District's mission statement is: to create an emotionally safe and intellectually challenging environment for our students, so that they may grow into the best possible versions of themselves.

The Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District is comprised of Surprise Valley Elementary School and Surprise Valley High School. Surprise Valley Elementary School serves students in grades K-8 and the high school, grades 9-12. At the present time, due to declining enrollment and other factors of financial uncertainty, Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District does not offer alternative education opportunities.

Surprise Valley Joint Unified School district excels in the area of appropriate teacher assignment. We currently have 100% of all staff members meeting Highly Qualified status. In the past, our students have consistently had access to standards-aligned instructional materials. We are currently in the process of switching over our curriculum to Common Core State Standards and are awaiting the Language Arts adoption. All of our stakeholder groups felt that our facilities were in good repair and the campuses were clean and well maintained.

<p>Our LCAP process began with the establishment of the LCAP committee. Once the committee was in place, staff, student and parent surveys were made available to help determine the attitudes and concerns of these groups as a starting point for further discussion. Next a schedule of meetings was developed to ensure input from all interested stakeholders. The first of these meetings, held on April 2, 2014, involved certificated and classified staff members, including representation of the bargaining units for both groups. At this meeting the overall purpose of the LCAP was presented and suggestions for formulating district goals were solicited from the group as a whole. Following lengthy discussion and numerous proposals, the group agreed upon four goals that addressed the primary concerns for district and school site improvements to meet the needs of all students and stakeholders.</p> <p>Following this initial meeting, a preliminary draft of the LCAP document was developed by the LCAP Committee that included the goals as</p>	<p>A. Conditions of Learning</p> <p>Implementation of State Standards: The elementary school has moved toward piloting state adopted materials for Mathematics, and both sites will be implementing Common Core aligned curriculum after the state adoption process for English Language Arts.</p> <p>Course access: Through discussions with our stakeholders, there was a clear interest in providing students more access to technology and additional electives. It was felt that students would become more engaged and committed to school if they were participating more Career and Technical Education Courses, and additional electives. It was also felt that by increasing these offerings, we would gain a competitive edge with the other schools in the county, thereby maintaining or increasing enrollment in the district.</p> <p>B. established at the meeting with certificated and classified staff. This draft document and the overall purpose of the LCAP was then presented at a meeting of the School Site Council/Parent Advisory Committee held on May 8, 2014, that included parents and student representatives. Feedback concerning the goals was discussed at this meeting and additional input was sought from the Site Council members and options for responding were made available through a variety of methods such as the possibility of additional meetings, emailed suggestions, or one-on-one meetings with an administrator or members of the LCAP committee. There were no additional suggestions or recommendations made at this time.

Following the meeting with the School Site Council/Parent Advisory Committee, a presentation to explain the purpose of the LCAP and the progress made in its development to date, was made to the Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District Board of Education at their regularly scheduled meeting on May 8, 2014. During this meeting opportunity was made available for members of the community, staff members, parents, and members of the Board to offer feedback and make suggestions for further refinement of the LCAP document. There were no additional suggestions or recommendations made subsequent to this meeting.

After the meeting on May 8, 2014, the LCAP committee brought together all the essential components beginning with the needs that were brought forward in the previous consultation process, the three year goals identified to meet each need, and what the district is proposing to do next in order to improve and expand services to our pupils and additional stakeholder groups.

On June 12, 2014, a draft of the LCAP document was presented at a public hearing during a regularly scheduled meeting of the Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District Board of Trustees. Members of the staff, district administration, board members and representatives of the public were in attendance and offered opportunity to review the document and offer additional suggestions prior to completing the final draft for presentation to the Board at the June 26, 2014 meeting for approval.

Pupil achievement: While we have consistently maintained high test scores and API scores, we recognize that we need to continually hold these goals close. One area of particular concern to our stakeholders is our low a-g completion rates among graduating seniors. Stakeholders felt this % needed to be increased to give all our students the opportunity to enter directly into the CSU/UC system. We hope that with our AVID implementation, we will be creating more of a college going culture.

C. Engagement

Parent Involvement: As with all schools, as we move towards the implementation of the Common Core State Standards, we find that we need to further educate parents on what those standards are, and in addition, defend (and promote) the adoption of these standards. One of the best ways to do this would be to have more parents involved on campus. We typically struggle with parental involvement, and find that very few parents spend any time on campus. In surveys completed on January 8, 2014 and on April 24, 2014 however, the majority of parents stated they were actively involved in their child's education. The challenge therefore will be to change the parent perspective to increase their role in the school setting.

Pupil Engagement: During our focus group meetings, a common question reoccurred. How do we keep students on our campuses? Recently, we have seen a large number of students transferring out of our district. The question always remains the same though; why are these students leaving? With the student exodus, a feeling of despair is left in the wake; parents feel that something bad must be happening at school to cause these children to leave, students feel there must be better ways to receive their education than what we currently offer, and the community wants to know what we are doing to drive students away? These are all difficult questions that our school must address if we are to maintain our enrollment.

School Climate: In our surveys and discussions with stakeholder groups, there was an overwhelming feeling that our students are very safe on

	<p>our campuses. However, stakeholder groups and administration recognize that feeling safe is no longer good enough in today's climate of school shootings and intruder alerts. Therefore, SVJUSD continues to focus energy on being proactive in keeping our students and staff safe at all times.</p>
